### Kintyre Revealed

Kintyre is a unique peninsula in the SW corner of Scotland. Only 80 miles long and 8 wide, Kintyre had 80 miles of ravishing beaches.

During May & June, Kintyre enjoys prolonged periods of dry sunny weather; this combined with the influence of the Gulf Stream ensures gardens are full of exotic plants. Off the usual tourist track, Kintyre retains a natural beauty and character unique to this part of Scotland

**For the Wildlife Enthusiast:** The peninsula affords the opportunity to observe myriad varieties of wildlife. Whether you are an ornithologist (200 species have been recorded) or a botanist (wild flowers occur in profusion), the long summer days will allow you to indulge your interest. Many of the rocky bays have colonies of seals, and you may just be lucky enough to sight the elusive otter, a basking shark or dolphin, perhaps in the bay in front of the house

**For the activity Minded:** Golf is particularly well catered for, with 5 golf courses including the championship course at Machrihanish. Anglers are spoilt for choice with sea, loch and salmon river fishing all close at hand. Walkers and artists alike are inspired by the stunning variety of scenery around every corner.

### For the Historian

Kintyre is rich in historical associations, from prehistoric and Celtic archaeology via St. Columba, Somerled and Robert the Bruce (who landed in the bay in front of Dunvalanree) to rebellions against King James II. The area is alive with sites to explore and folklore to delve into!
